

### County 4-H Club Day - February 2nd

County Club Day is an opportunity for youth to show off their talent and get a little feedback from a judge in the process. If you like to sing, dance, play an instrument, demonstrate or talk about a favorite item or subject, county club days is the perfect place to do just that!! County Club Day will be Sunday, February 2nd at Lansing Middle School.

There are many events you can participate in at County Club Day. I have included a Club Day Guidelines at a Glance at the end of this newsletter to help you. I encourage you to try something new.

Along with competing in your selected events, we will have three judging opportunities at County Club Day. You can participate in photography judging, Horticulture Judging, as well as FCS judging. This is a great way to get that check mark for your record book.

This year we will be using FairEntry to register for Club Day. The process is similar to how you register for county fair. You will access the FairEntry program through our website or through the link below. The system works with your 4-H Online Enrollment information. You will use your 4-Honline email and password to log into FairEntry, just like you do at fair time. The included Club Day Guidelines at a Glance directly mimics the hierarchy in FairEntry. The bluish/purple bar from the guidelines corresponds to "Department" on the hierarchy, the "Type" on the guidelines corresponds to "Section" on the hierarchy, and "Participants" on the guidelines corresponds to "Class" on the hierarchy.

### Market Beef

Market Beef Weigh-in will be held on Saturday, March 1, 2025 from 8am to 9:30am at the Leavenworth County Fairgrounds. Market Beef letters will be mailed out soon. Your letters will include instructions as well as the paperwork you will need for March 1st. All Market Beef worksheets are due at weigh-in. Please also bring \$5 for each animal tag. Please Note: Market Beef Animals that are not tagged and weighed in on March 1st will not be eligible to exhibit at the Leavenworth County Fair this year. If you are unable to attend, please arrange for someone else to bring your animals and paperwork.

### Goat, Sheep and Swine

Small Animal Tagging is scheduled for Sunday, May 4th. All Swine, goats and sheep are required to attend this event. More information along with letters for each species will be coming in Late March/Early April. Please save the date!!

## **Record Books**

What are Record Books?

They document the knowledge and skills that have been learned; they also record your experiences in leadership, citizenship and community service. Even though they may seem like a waste of time now, record keeping will become important when you become an adult as records are essential for any adult to be successful. Also, as you become older it is nice to look at what you have accomplished and how you grew to be a proficient citizen.

Start early. If you plan to complete a project report form, choose what project now. It is much easier to plan out what you are going to do then come September, try and make things fit. Write goals at the beginning of the year not the end. Keep a separate notebook or a calendar to note your progress or do some journaling. Keep records on what you do and learn as you work on your project(s), list sources, ideas, materials, costs and take pictures. Include what worked well, what did not and what you enjoyed the most.



## **4-H Scholarships**

**Local:** The David D. Klamm Memorial Scholarship is a \$500 scholarship available to 4-Hers who have been a Leavenworth County 4-Her for the past 5 years or more, have completed one year of post-secondary education, enrolled in 2 or 4 year college at 12 or more semester hours OR enrolled full-time in a technical institution. Scholarship applications can be found on our website under 4-H Youth Development/Awards and Scholarships. Application is due to the Extension Office by June 30th.

Leavenworth County 4-H Foundation gives senior scholarships. Check with the foundation for more details. Also, Leavenworth County Council awards leadership scholarships to 4-Hers who have shown exceptional leadership in 4-H. The application for this scholarship is on the Extension website.

**State:** Kansas 4-H Scholarships are available to current and past 4-hers who are seeking to further their education after high school. General criteria included high school academic standing and 4-H achievement and leadership. ### **Citizenship in Action**

Have you attended Citizenship in Action, also known as CIA? This is a great opportunity for youth aged 13-18 to travel to the Kansas State Capitol in Topeka to get a first-hand look at how our state legislation functions. This event takes place on a Sunday and Monday over the President's Day holiday weekend. This year, Citizenship in Action will be held on February 16-17, 2025. One main goal of this conference is to educate our youth about the government system. CIA is designed to help 4-H members understand that they have a voice when it comes to current issues, and to teach them how to participate in making important decisions. Youth who attend this event will have the opportunity to meet with State Representatives and Senators from the communities that they live in. They will get to tour the Capitol building and watch parliamentary procedure in action. Transportation and chaperoning for Citizenship in Action will be provided by the Extension Office.
